

Dear CAA Awards Committee,

It is with great pleasure that I write this letter in support of Serena Christianson's nomination for Primary Advisor of the Year. I have been Serena's colleague in the School of Life Sciences (SOLS) for over three years.

As the second longest-serving advisor currently employed in SOLS's on-ground team, Serena has mastered the complexities of the SOLS curriculum across ten majors, and has grown some of the closest student/advisor relationships I have seen from *any* advisor in our department. Her transparent and honest advising style allows her students to trust her, which keeps them coming back time after time. Prior to COVID-19, many would even stop by her office next door to mine just to say hello. Before we began an assigned advising model in Fall 2020, Serena always had a consistent caseload of returning students that specifically requested to meet with her. One of our ASU Online students in particular, Brianah, was able to develop such a close relationship with Serena that she flew across the country to present at the annual SOLUR Research Symposium so she could also meet Serena in person. When I met Brianah at the symposium back in 2019, I will never forget her saying how much of her academic success she owed to Serena. Brianah is now a PhD student at ASU.

Serena has gone beyond the call of duty on numerous occasions, most recently with assisting Dr. Carolyn Compton on a project in BioDesign's COVID-19 testing lab. A group of Barrett students is working collectively on a film to tell the story of the testing lab through the lens of biomedicine, business, technology and law. With Dr. Compton already incredibly busy teaching and running the COVID lab daily, Serena stepped up and assists with continuous student questions surrounding the project. She is the liaison between the students, Dr. Compton, and other interdisciplinary faculty involved in the project, often holding meetings in the early evening after work hours. Her ability to develop strong, reliable relationships with faculty is top-notch due to her confident demeanor and strong communication.

Serena has been pivotal in affecting change for how we think about advising STEM students in general. After working on numerous innovative career events, Serena has been an advocate for students to think outside the box in regards to careers. She has been the strongest advocate for encouraging advisors to have more conversations surrounding careers in their advising appointments, and to bring up the various directions one can take in different scientific fields. Her career events have not only opened up the students' minds about pathways in the life sciences, but our advising team's minds as well.

She mentors each new advisor and trains the entire team in career advising, believing that all advisors should have the knowledge and skill to have career conversations with students. She has changed the culture in SOLS Advising around this. Before Serena was hired in this role, Career and Internship advising was the purview of one advisor on the team. Few advisors had much knowledge of career paths other than health professional school or graduate school. Her "Science of ..." series has been wildly popular with students and advisors alike. She has forged partnerships with other Schools and Colleges, which has led to increased opportunities for our students and a more diverse understanding of what you can do with a Life Science degree.

Serena is inclusive in her practices, always recording events she holds for those who cannot attend and making sure those recordings are available on the SOLS website. She is a champion of inclusive practices for online students. She was the first in our school to invite an online

student to present in a research symposium, which was a game changer in what we now perceive as possible for this very important and growing group of students.

Serena always knows who can help in any situation. Whether it is referring a student in distress or connecting colleagues working on similar projects, she is quick to facilitate connections. She manages difficult conversations with ease and without judgment. She is equally adept at following up and making sure there has been resolution. She just doesn't let students (or colleagues) fall through the cracks. Reading her advising notes actually gives you a sense of the person, not just what classes that student is taking. Some notes you might find from Serena "Met with Ivanna briefly... putting on list to make note to get to know her more" or "big personality, confident, sells puppies" makes it very clear that she takes the time to get to know students and develop relationships. Intrusive, developmental, whatever the advising style, Serena adeptly shifts her style to suit the student and the situation. She created a Notable Students document in our office to make sure we can all nominate students when opportunities arise. This has provided opportunities for students to shine!

Serena's dedication to students, our advising team, and the whole ASU family is unquestionable. I am pleased to recommend Serena Christianson for the CAA "Primary Advisor" Award. I serve as an academic advisor in the School of Life Sciences at Arizona State University and have been working closely with Serena since I was hired this past summer.

One domain in which Serena stands out is in her willingness to help novice advisors. When I joined the team, I shadowed Serena's advising appointments and she reverse-shadowed mine. This was an invaluable experience. Serena took time after each session to answer my questions in often extraordinary detail, and was unhesitating in her willingness to share email templates, useful links, and access to other resources. Even among the more senior advisors, she is regarded as a font of wisdom. I feel comfortable coming to her with the most idiosyncratic questions, confident that she will be both eager to help and correct in her suggestions. Conversing with her in this way is like quizzing an expert who enjoys being tested on her knowledge. I always come away learning more.

In my time shadowing Serena's appointments, I also saw firsthand the personalized attention she gives to her advisees. I could feel immediately that Serena did not just see her students as degree-seekers, but had succeeded in getting to know them as individuals. I remember one advising session that started off simply enough; a student wanted to know Serena's opinion on Pass/Fail grading. Serena not only talked him through this grading option but soon had him opening up about the additional responsibilities he faced serving as a student representative on the Arizona Board of Regents. Serena deftly wove together her knowledge of his extracurricular activities with his dual-degree in Neuroscience and Innovation to recommend he look into a graduate program offered by ASU's School of Management that had only recently come online. I'm not sure how many of our other advisors would have thought to mention it, or even known about it. In any case, I remember being impressed by what an apt suggestion it was given the student's academic interests and career goals. I witnessed several times Serena's ability to anticipate students' needs based on her capacity to connect with them first as people.

Finally, there is no one in the department who does more to facilitate our advisees' transition from student life to the career world. Not only does she run the on-campus team's internship program, but she also teaches a course on Career and Professional Development in the Life Sciences. She helps students explore the array of opportunities that exist for Biology and Microbiology majors by bringing in questspeakers from diverse fields and organizing events. These events (which have included, for instance, a beer-tasting for upper-classmen to show the role of microbiology in brewing) open students' eyes to offthe-beaten-path career options in the life sciences. I have spoken to multiple students who have raved about her course, saying it gave them space to explore career options they had not previously known existed. Serena is constantly developing and implementing ideas for how we can make the degree more relevant for our students.

I am writing in support of Serena Christianson to be the recipient of the Council of Academic Advisors award for Academic Advising-Primary Role. As a student and advisee of Serena for nearly four years, I cannot recommend her highly enough for the recognition of the Outstanding Advisor Award.

The first time I met with Serena was over the summer of 2017. I had encountered unique difficulties with my schedule as an incoming freshman and was having trouble communicating my needs over email with the office, so I decided to drive 40 minutes to campus and seek assistance. I arrived just as the advisors were leaving to conduct orientations for the rest of the day. I still distinctly remember Serena turning to the other advisors, letting them know that she would catch up soon, and unlocking her office for me. Within 10 minutes, all of my questions were answered, and I cannot describe the amount of relief I felt as a young college student who had been listened to, understood, and advocated for. When I got home, my parents were impressed that she had gone her of her way to help me and told me to hold on to her business card; I still have it in my box of college memories.

Serena's advocacy only became more apparent over the semesters. Regardless of whether my questions pertained to life sciences, my career goals in pre-health, or my minor in music, she would immediately supply me with the resources I needed or refer me to the exact individual in other departments that could help. At many of our earlier meetings, I would start crying because of how overwhelmed I felt, but I would leave every appointment with newly instilled self-confidence due to her knowledge, guidance, and compassion. When friends and classmates were struggling, I would suggest they make an appointment with Serena, and they always came back describing that same feeling that comes with being heard, respected, and provided all the resources that one could need to be successful.

The greatest help from Serena came shortly after I had begun treatment for a mental health disorder. I had begun to feel a little more capable in my field, and I was considering altering my career path to pursue an MD. The notion was exciting but terrifying. When she asked what had led me to change plans, I was afraid to disclose my diagnosis because it made me feel weak; still, I decided to tell her because of the trust we had built. Her response was filled with warmth, understanding, and positivity, and for the first time in my college career, I did not feel weak, but strong enough to pursue the path that I was passionate about.

Ms. Christianson is absolutely capable at running graduation requirements, assembling schedules, and distributing career information, but the way she cares for her students, goes out of her way to get answers outside her department, and exceeds beyond expectations to know her advisees and meet their individual needs sets her apart. I believe she is the highest standard of an academic advisor, and I cannot imagine a more qualified candidate than Serena Christianson.
